CHOP & CHAT

Chop and Chat has had another busy, productive year. During the past year we have provided approximately 780 hearty frozen meals for those in need. We have also produced approximately 400 preserves from the fruit and vegetables that were donated to us. During the year we cooked food for the High Tea fundraiser and the volunteers helped with the set up and running of the day.

We thank the generous donations by Foodshare, Flavorite and the Tatura community.

The stall at the entrance to the Community House enables us to showcase our preserves and generate some income to help cover the expenses involved in running our program. A big thank you to everyone who purchased products or donated produce during the year.

Running the Chop and Chat program is very much a team effort, and I am very appreciative of the input of all those who have contributed to the program over the past year. We work closely with the Generations Op Shop and most of our frozen meals are distributed through their food pantry. On the days we have our cook ups we look forward to seeing Jacob come into the kitchen to take our orders so we can have a hot drink with our morning tea. We also rely on the Community House staff and reception volunteers to support our program in a variety of ways. It may involve printing labels, ordering equipment, topping up our stall, sorting the food from Food Share and applying for funding just to mention a few tasks.

It has been a privilege working with such an enthusiastic, hardworking, supportive, reliable team of volunteers who have ensured the success of the Chop & Chat sessions over the past year.

HOMEWORK CLUB

Tatura Community House continues to provide an after-school tutoring program for local students. This program occurs on a Tuesday in the Tatura Library from 3.30 until 4.30pm for primary aged students. It is available to students who wish to improve their reading, writing and number skills. We tend to concentrate on maths skills for upper primary students and literacy skills for the younger students.

We would like to encourage more secondary students to attend from 4.30 until 5.25pm to review and improve their understanding of the maths curriculum. This is a valuable session for students as it allows them to review their work and consolidate their understanding of mathematical concepts.

The tutoring is free of charge. The aim of the program is to encourage children to develop their maths skills and their enjoyment of Mathematics and Literacy. We would like students to realise that it is okay to get something wrong. After all, we often learn from our mistakes. We appreciate the dedicated help and support of our tutors, without whom the programme would not occur. They always encourage and remain positive towards our students.

Parents are always welcome to contact us to discuss how we can help their child. The library is a wonderful venue for the students to learn in. We greatly appreciate and thank Kerrie for her positive support and help. A special thank you to Bev and Ann who work well together to provide, review and enhance the program. We hope to continue the program into the future and rely on the support and input from parents, volunteers and the community to make it a success.

FOOD PANTRY

In partnership with Generations OpShop and with support from various sources, including FoodShare, Ritchies IGA, FoodWorks, Flavorite and generous donations from community members and organisations, the Food Pantry is a comprehensive program addressing food and hygiene needs. This includes a wide range of non-perishable foods like cereals, canned goods, UHT milk, biscuits, rice, pasta, cooking oil, and more. We also have a basic stock of personal hygiene items. Occasionally, the pantry provides pet food as well.

This year we were fortunate to receive a generous donation from Bega, who supplied a display fridge. The new Harvest Fridge is now located in the foyer of the Community House and Library, right alongside the Harvest Table. It allows us to store fresh produce, dairy, and other perishable items safely, keeping food fresher for longer and making a real difference to the quality of what we can offer. This is a valuable addition to our food relief efforts, and we extend our sincere thanks to Bega for their support of our community.

The invaluable contribution of the Chop & Chat group, which regularly prepares and freezes meals, enhances the pantry's offerings. Moreover, the community's food relief is supported by the harvest table in the foyer, where individuals can share surplus fruits and vegetables for others to take freely.

In these uncertain times, the food pantry at Tatura Community House remains a testament to the resilience and kindness of its volunteers and the community's generosity. Beyond providing nourishment, it fosters a sense of togetherness, reminding us that, even during challenging periods, a caring community can truly make a meaningful difference in the lives of its members.



COFFEE HUB CLUB

The Coffee Hub Club continues to be a valuable part of our community. Held every Tuesday, the club provides a welcoming space for people of all ages to gather, enjoy affordable drinks, and connect with one another. Participants tell us how much they look forward to the Coffee Hub morning, and it's lovely to see valuable relationships continuing and developing. Jacob prepares a variety of beverages, including coffee, tea, hot chocolate, and Milo, catering to different tastes. His skills are very much appreciated not only by the Coffee Hub attendees, but by the wider community who attend a variety of sessions during the week also.

Participants arrive throughout the morning, depending upon their commitments, catching up with friends in a relaxed atmosphere. Parents, carers, and children from the Tuesday playgroup join in for morning tea, creating a lively time of conversation and interaction. This intergenerational gathering allows people from different walks of life to share time together, fostering a sense of community.

Beyond the drinks, the Coffee Hub Club serves as a place for social interaction and an opportunity to learn about other activities happening at the house. Many also take the chance to visit the nearby library, adding another layer of engagement for those who attend. Overall, the Coffee Hub Club provides a simple but important way for people to connect, share, and enjoy each other's company in a comfortable and welcoming setting. A second group of players was started in Term 4 2024 on Wednesday mornings. In 2025 both the morning and afternoon Mahjong groups have grown in membership.



MORNING EXERCISES

Our morning exercises have offered a great mix of Strength & Conditioning and Circuit Training, adding Tummy, Hips & Thighs halfway through the year.

Morning exercises run on Mondays and Fridays. Participants can choose sessions that suit their goals, with options to focus on strength and bone health or combine cardio, agility, and endurance in a circuit format. Tummy, Hips & Thighs focuses on lower body strength. Sessions are friendly, small-group, and adaptable for all fitness levels.

We have partnered with Shannon Cooper whose background as a personal trainer makes her the perfect fit for our classes. We appreciate Shannon's supportive and energetic attitude, her great sense of humour and especially her reliability. We hope to expand exercises classes in the future and keep working with Shannon for a long time.



YOGA

Term 3 of 2024 was an exciting season for yoga at Tatura Community House, with new classes introduced to meet the needs of our growing community. One of the highlights was the launch of Chair Yoga, a gentle and accessible form of yoga that quickly became a favourite. Chair Yoga is ideal for beginners, seniors, and those returning to movement after injury or illness. It offers participants the chance to discover mindful movement in a safe, supportive, and welcoming environment. The success of this class has secured it as a permanent feature in our program.

Another wonderful addition this term was our new Saturday morning yoga class, which proved to be extremely popular and was fully booked out. This session gave community members an opportunity to start their weekend with calmness, strength, and connection, setting the tone for the week ahead.

For our more experienced students, we also introduced Vinyasa Yoga, a dynamic style that links breath with movement. This practice offers a flowing sequence of postures that build strength, flexibility, and focus, and it has been warmly embraced by those seeking a more advanced yoga experience.

Our yoga program simply wouldn't be what it is without the passion and guidance of our wonderful instructor, Anh, whose dedication has helped yoga thrive at Tatura Community House. Each week, up to 65 people now take part in classes, making yoga one of our fastest-growing programs.





KNITTING, SEWING & CROCHET SPINNING, WEAVING & FIBRE ART

The Arts & Crafts activities on Tuesdays have become a vibrant and creative space for participants to engage in a variety of traditional crafts. The day is divided into two sessions, each focusing on different forms of artistry.

The morning session, from 9:00am to 1:00pm, is dedicated to knitting, sewing, and crochet. Participants bring their own projects, which can range from knitting and crocheting to quilting, lace making, diamond painting, and more. This session provides a great opportunity not only to work on individual arts and crafts but also to socialize and exchange tips and tricks with fellow crafters. The atmosphere is relaxed and supportive, allowing people to share ideas and learn from one another. For those looking to expand their skills, it's a perfect opportunity to pop in and learn how to operate a sewing machine or get assistance with a tricky knitting pattern.

The afternoon session focuses on Spinning, Weaving, and Fibre Arts, with a particular emphasis on spinning wool from scratch. Each participant brings their own spinning wheel, and together they create wonderful yarn in a variety of shades and textures. The craft of spinning wool is a traditional skill that is being kept alive through this group. It's a rewarding process, with the end product being beautiful, hand-spun wool yarn.

Both sessions offer a chance to preserve and promote these timeless crafts while fostering a strong sense of community. We encourage more people to join the group, whether they are experienced or just beginning to explore the world of arts and crafts.



PLAYGROUP & A CUPPA

Our Playgroup & a Cuppa runs every Tuesday from 9:30 to 10:30am. It began as a Mothergoose playgroup, but in 2025 we broadened its scope and renamed it to reflect the wider range of activities it now offers.

The playgroup is very child-led, depending upon the ages, needs and interests of the children in attendance at each session. Some of the activities the playgroup offers are singing, action songs, stories and games. We are constantly welcoming new families who find the calming environment instrumental in assisting their children to engage, learn, and make friends. After the playgroup, families are invited to join the Coffee Hub for a multigenerational gathering, where parents, carers, and children can socialise further. This part of the morning is a great opportunity for everyone to connect, relax, and enjoy a coffee or tea together. Lovely conversations take place, and many positive learning situations arise such as ensuring everyone has a seat at the table and taking turns to speak, in a relaxed and supportive environment.

Thanks to all the families who attend regularly and whilst some may come and go, we know we have helped them on their journey in life in some way. Not only does the playgroup help children make new friends but also allows parents and carers to build social connections and find support.

Parents can also tap into valuable services on-site, such as Maternal and Child Health, and our childcare centre, The Cubby. Maternal and Child Health staff regularly introduce their clients to our playgroup and TCH staff and volunteers are always available to provide information about services like The Orange Door, mental health support, and therapists, making it a beneficial experience for all.

54 REASONS PLAYGROUP

The 54 Reasons Playgroup is a regular part of our program here at Tatura Community House. Held every Wednesday morning, it is open to families with children aged 0 to 5 years.

The playgroup is run by professional early childhood educators from 54 Reasons (Save the Children Australia). Their role is to plan and guide activities that support early learning and social development in a safe and structured environment.

Sessions include songs, stories, craft, and free play, with activities adjusted to suit different ages and abilities.

Parents and carers also benefit from the program. It provides a space to meet other families, share experiences, and connect with local information and services. The format is straightforward and consistent each week, making it easy for families to attend regularly.

The group has quickly become a staple in our term program, with strong attendance and positive feedback from participants. Families appreciate the combination of play-based learning for children and practical support for parents.



LEGO CLUB

The Lego Club has been a fantastic space for children to unleash their creativity and build their favorite Lego creations. Kids are welcome to free-build anything they can imagine or assemble one of the sets we have available.

This provides a wonderful opportunity for them to develop fine motor skills, problem-solving abilities, and a sense of accomplishment, all while having fun.

Beyond the individual skill-building, the club offers a great environment for socialising. Kids bond over their shared love of Lego, learning to collaborate, share ideas, and celebrate each other's achievements. It's a space where friendships blossom, and imaginations run wild.

We are deeply grateful to Mignon and Malcolm for their generous donation of Lego bricks. Their contribution has been invaluable, and those bricks are definitely being put to good use in the hands of our creative young builders. The Lego Club continues to be a wonderful gathering for kids and families alike, fostering creativity and connection each week.





The Walkway Gallery continued to provide opportunities for local artists to exhibit their work and for the community to view a wide variety of art. Across the year, we hosted several exhibitions that showed the diversity of styles and approaches in our region.

The Gallery featured Eclectic Mixed Mediums by Fiona Brown. Fiona's exhibition displayed works that reflect her interest in using her imagination and in re-purposing materials. Having developed her style through a wide range of workshops and personal practice, Fiona has created pieces that show her personal journey as an artist.

In September 2024, the Red Shoes Rock exhibition raised awareness of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD). The exhibition included a striking display of red shoes artworks from over 40 artists, highlighting the global effort to bring attention to FASD and its impact on families. The event was well attended and opened important conversations, showing how the Gallery can also be used for education and community awareness.

Another exhibition brought together the work of Jacob Dedman, Sharron Handley, and Terry John. Jacob, a young photographer, displayed images ranging from natural landscapes to more abstract subjects. Sharron presented pieces using colour, texture, and different materials to explore energy and emotion. Terry, having moved from detailed drawings into painting, showed works that used bold colours and shapes. The three artists combined created a varied exhibition that attracted strong interest and gave the community a chance to experience different art forms in one show.

The Gallery also hosted an exhibition by Janet Fogarty of Euroa showing her beautiful bird drawings. With a background in graphic design, illustration, and printmaking, Janet has taught art for many years and continues to be influenced by her connection to nature and local landscapes.

Together, these exhibitions highlighted the range of creative talent in our area and confirmed the role of the Walkway Gallery as a valued space for local art. We thank the artists for their contributions and the volunteers and visitors who support the Gallery throughout the year.

ADULT COMMUNITY FURTHER EDUCATION (ACFE)

Tatura Community House has delivered courses for adult education for many years and continued to do so in the 2024/25 year. ACFE is funded by the Victorian Government, based on the amount of hours of education delivered. Tatura Community House is delivering 600 hours of adult education in the calendar year 2025. We also received an IT support grant as part of ACFE funding. Tatura Community House is a recognised educational provider.

Learn English

Our ongoing course 'Learn English' provides an opportunity for students to learn and improve their English. We are now offering evening sessions only to accommodate learners with work or family responsibilities during the day. We taught English to students from different cultures, including Thailand, Vietnam and China. Our classes are tailored to the individual language skill level of each learner. This allows them to progress really well. Our learners are going strong and are looking forward to another year of learning.

Digital Essentials I - Introduction to Smartphones and Tablets

In this flexible computer and technology class students explored different topics from the digital world such as online meetings, email, managing attachments, scanning, photo editing, management and online services, digital citizenship and online safety, tablets and devices, streaming services, MyGov, online banking, and online shopping. Congratulations to our proud learners who successfully completed this 30 hour course!





TATURA'S 150TH ANNIVERSARY

The 1874 founding date marked both the Tatura Primary School's and the town's 150th anniversary in 2024. Located in the heart of the Goulburn Valley, Tatura developed rapidly in the late 19th century as irrigation schemes transformed the region into one of Australia's most productive food bowls. The town became known for its dairying, fruit growing, and food-processing industries, with major employers like Tatura Milk and a strong connection to research and innovation in agriculture. Tatura is also remembered for its role during the Second World War, when it hosted large prisoner-of-war and internment camps that shaped local history and brought international links to the small town.

The anniversary celebrations took place in October 2024 at Tatura Primary School, the town's original school which has educated generations of children since 1874. The event drew a large crowd of residents, visitors, former students, and past teachers, all keen to acknowledge the town's heritage and achievements. The program included displays, entertainment, and stalls highlighting different aspects of Tatura's story.

Tatura Community House played a visible role at the celebration with a stall featuring local merchandise. Popular items included "I Love Tatura" hats, a special edition "150 Years of Tatura" hat, as well as badges and fridge magnets. The centrepiece of the stall was the release of two unique tea towels produced through a collaboration with local artists. Naomi Kerr designed a striking floral artwork, while Phyllis Mactier contributed finely detailed illustrations of iconic Tatura buildings. Both designs were screen printed onto tea towels by Tatura Community House, with the work made possible by the efforts of many dedicated volunteers. Greeting cards featuring the two designs were also produced, giving visitors the chance to take home a lasting keepsake of the anniversary.

The celebrations were a reminder of Tatura's strong sense of community and its ability to honour the past while looking to the future. The involvement of residents, former teachers and students, local organisations, and volunteers ensured that the 150th anniversary was both a respectful acknowledgement of history and a lively community event.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Another eventful and exciting year has passed at Tatura Community House, and we are thrilled to reflect on the growth and success we have achieved together.

Our programs and activities have continued to succeed, offering a diverse range of opportunities for everyone in our community. From fitness classes and yoga to creative pursuits like knitting, sewing & crochet, and spinning, weaving & fiber arts, we have something for everyone. We stay committed to adult education, and offered classes in English, smartphone and tablet use, family history, and more. Our volunteer groups continue to make an impact through projects like Boomerang Bags and Chop & Chat. In terms of social groups, we have something for every interest—Playgroup, Mahjong, Bridge, the Italian Ladies Social Group, Coffee Hub, and Tat Gathering are just a few examples of the ways we bring people together. Children find activities in two playgroups for pre-schoolers and our Homework and Lego Club offer support and fun times for school-aged children.

Our events calendar has been full of wonderful community-focused activities. We hosted our annual High Tea in August 2024, the Red Shoes Rock Exhibition in the Walkway Gallery with over 40 artists participating in September and our Christmas Barbecue in December 2024. Our food relief initiatives have continued to thrive with the support of Generations OpShop and through donations by Foodshare, Flavorite Tatura and the community.

Our childcare centre, The Cubby, continues to flourish, with consistently high numbers and glowing feedback from families. Our dedicated staff create a welcoming and nurturing environment for the children, and we have built an outstanding reputation—thank you, Cubby girls!

CUBBY CHILDCARE COORDINATOR'S REPORT

Another great year filled with lots of fun activities for our children and families has passed very quickly.

Booking numbers have been high in the last 12 months with a small waiting list throughout the year. Over the winter months we've seen a drop in attendances. It is the flu season and COVID is still around. We appreciate all families that keep their children at home when they are not well therefore protecting the health of all other children, families and educators.

On average our bookings per week were Tuesdays and Thursdays 15 children and Wednesdays and Fridays 14 children.

The Cubby requires to be staffed with three educators at all times. Staff has been consistent over the last 12 months with Tarja and Lucy doing four full days. Emma, Katy and Bonnie shared the position of the third educator throughout the week with Emma covering morning and Katy covering afternoon shifts. During the second half of 2024 Bonnie continued covering the afternoon shift on Thursday while completing her Cert III in Early Childhood Education and Care. At the end of 2024, Bonnie moved on to run her own family day care and Katy is currently covering Thursday afternoons as well.

We have signed up for the Smiles for Miles program which highlights the importance of good oral health care, healthy eating and providing families with information about local dentist services and the Child Dental Benefits Schedule. As part of this process, we are now offering milk to our children and they just love it.

Children at the Cubby have enjoyed a variety of interesting supervised skill-based activities such as

- Smiles for Miles activities based around sometimes food and everyday food
- Learning how to brush teeth
- Dentist activities and reading books about oral health/healthy eating
- Making healthy food from scratch, growing vegies, cooking and baking
- Cubby Library providing a wide range of books and a book bag for each child
- Dress up for book week and lots of reading
- Footy grand final with pies and chips
- Climbing and developing motor skills on our freshly powder coated frames

One of the highlights of the year is our new addition to the Cubby family - Lenny the Lion. Our fluffy toy lion Lenny has been on many adventures. All children have taken Lenny home and had great adventures that were captured on camera. We created a book with all of Lenny's home visits. The book is available at the Cubby library for families to take home and share in everyone's adventures with Lenny.

The children enjoyed lots of cooking experiences where they made yummy treats from scratch. On the menu were carrot cake, carrot soup, hot chips, celery and grape caterpillars, zucchini slice, smoothies, and freshly pressed orange juice.

The children continued to grow our garden planting seeds and seedlings, watering the plants, watch them grow and eventually enjoy eating freshly picked fruit and vegetables.

We have celebrated quite a few events with NAIDOC week (July), Father's Day and Footy Grand Final (September), Children's Week (October), Christmas (December), Easter (April), and Mother's Day (May). Each event was special. We would like to thank Corey for his presentations during NAIDOC week showing the children indigenous dances, paint, and story telling. Christmas was a great time for the families as we organised a party with the obligatory Santa visit and the opportunities for families to take pictures. Just before Easter, the Easter Bunny called in to drop off some chocolate eggs. And let's not forget our pampering afternoon tea for all those wonderful mums and special women in our lives that we hosted the Friday before Mother's Day. It is great to see how we have great friendships and support within the Cubby family.

I would like to thank Nadine and Tom for the endless help and support over the 12 months. To my team, thanks for all your hard work and dedication. I'm looking forward to another great year.

We look forward to the next 12 months, full of lots more adventures.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (VIC). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity. The Association is a not-for-profit entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

(a) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows that will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

(c) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(d) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements. Those cash flows are discounted using market yields on national government bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows.

(e) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured using the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

(g) Revenue and Other Income

Non-reciprocal grant revenue is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income when the association obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the association and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

When grant revenue is received whereby the association incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

The association receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for zero or a nominal value. These assets are recognised at fair value on the date of acquisition in the statement of financial position, with a corresponding amount of income recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customer.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(h) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Report on the Financial Report

I have reviewed the financial report of Tatura Community House Incorporated, which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025 income statement, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the responsible persons' declaration.

Responsibilities of Responsible Entities for the Financial Report
